Section - A

Question 1: Look at the given picture carefully and infer the income of the bank.



Choose the correct option from the following:

- (a) The difference between the amount deposited and borrowed by the bank to Reserve Bank of India.
- (b) The difference of amount of interest between what is charged from borrowers and what is paid to depositors.
- (c) The difference of interest rate between what is charged from borrowers and what is charged from depositors.
- (d) The difference between the amount deposited by the depositor and borrowed by the borrower.

Correct Answer: (b) The difference of amount of interest between what is charged from borrowers and what is paid to depositors.

Solution: A bank's core source of income hinges on charging a higher rate of interest from those who take loans than it pays to individuals who deposit money. Specifically:

- The bank charges borrowers an interest rate on loans.
- The bank pays depositors a (generally lower) interest rate for keeping money in savings or fixed deposits.

The difference in these two rates—often called the "spread" or "margin"—becomes the bank's primary profit.

Why others are incorrect:

• (a) Focuses on amounts rather than the crucial aspect of interest, which actually generates revenue.





- (c) Mentions interest rates but does not consider the principal amounts involved, limiting its link to the bank's actual income.
- (d) Deals with principal amounts of deposits and loans, not the interest component that forms the true profit driver.

When evaluating a bank's earnings, always distinguish between the principal (amount borrowed or deposited) and the interest rate differential, which is the real key to bank profitability.

Correct Answer: (a) Reserve Bank of India

Solution: The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) is the central regulatory authority that supervises and controls the functioning of formal sources of loans, including banks and financial institutions in India. It ensures compliance with financial regulations and policies to maintain economic stability.

Quick Tip

The RBI regulates the banking sector, ensuring financial stability and policy implementation in India.

Question 2: Why do lenders often require collateral before lending a loan? Choose the most suitable option from the following:

Solution: By insisting on collateral, lenders protect themselves against the borrower's potential failure to repay. Collateral is any valuable asset—such as property, vehicles, or investments—that borrowers pledge. Should a borrower default, the lender has the right to take possession of this asset to recover at least part of the loan amount.

Why others are incorrect:

- (a) Collateral does not directly translate into lower interest rates.
- (b) Collateral is purely a financial safeguard, not about fostering personal connections.
- (c) While banks aim for profit, collateral specifically helps in controlling risk, not just profit expansion.

Quick Tip

Collateral-based lending drastically reduces a lender's exposure to bad debts, hence it is a cornerstone of secure credit practices.

Question 3: Which of the following are developmental goals of a prosperous farmer?

Solution: A well-off farmer primarily seeks:

- **Higher support prices for crops (II)** to ensure adequate returns and mitigate market fluctuations.
- Assured high family income (III) reflecting financial stability and security for the household.

Why others are incorrect:

- (I) "Better wages" is more significant for wage earners or farm laborers, not generally for prosperous landowners.
- (IV) "More days for work" is again a concern for daily-wage workers rather than those already prospering.

Quick Tip

Prosperous farmers focus on maximizing profits and ensuring steady incomes, while those with fewer resources place greater emphasis on employment days and daily wages.

Question 4: Which one of the following is an example of organized sector activities?

- (a) A farmer irrigating his field.
- (b) A handloom weaver working in her house.
- (c) A headload worker carrying cement.
- (d) A teacher taking classes in a government school.

Correct Answer: (d) A teacher taking classes in a government school

Solution: The organized sector is marked by **regular jobs, contracts, fixed working hours, and retirement benefits**, all of which characterize government service. A teacher employed in a government school enjoys these benefits and works under formal terms.

Why others are incorrect:

• (a), (b), and (c) are typical examples of the unorganized sector, where there are neither formal contracts nor significant legal protections.





Jobs in the organized sector guarantee set benefits like provident fund and paid leaves, which are generally absent in unorganized work.

Question 5: Choose the correct option to fill the blank.

Correct Answer: (c) Liberalisation

Why others are incorrect:

- (a) Disinvestment: Selling state-owned stakes to private investors—this is not about removing trade barriers.
- (b) Special Economic Zones: Specific areas offering unique benefits to businesses, not a blanket policy removing restrictions.
- (d) Foreign Direct Investment: Involves cross-border investments in businesses but does not automatically imply lifting domestic trade barriers.

Quick Tip

Hint: Think of liberalisation as creating an open environment for both domestic and foreign companies to flourish with fewer bureaucratic obstacles.

Question 6: Which one of the following indices is given priority by the World Bank with





respect to development?

Correct Answer: (d) Per Capita Income

Solution: The World Bank prioritizes Per Capita Income as a measure of development. It is an indicator of the average income of individuals in a country and is commonly used to classify countries as low, middle, or high-income economies. Other indices, like Infant Mortality Rate, are also important but not given the same priority by the World Bank in its economic classifications.

Number of Members = 4

Average Income =
$$\frac{1,30,000}{4} = 32,500$$

The average monthly income of the family is Rs. 32,500/-.

To calculate the average, always divide the total sum by the number of items or members. Double-check calculations for accuracy.

- (a): Does not relate to checks and balances, which involve representative government.
- (c): Checks and balances regulate governance but do not specifically prevent constitutional changes.
- (d): Contradicts the principle of checks and balances, which aims to distribute power rather than consolidate it.





Checks and balances are key to preventing the abuse of power and maintaining accountability within democratic governance.

Question 9: Which one of the following countries has a two-party system?

Correct Answer: (b) United Kingdom

Solution: The United Kingdom has a two-party system, dominated historically by the Conservative Party and the Labour Party. While smaller parties exist, these two have traditionally held the majority of power in Parliament.

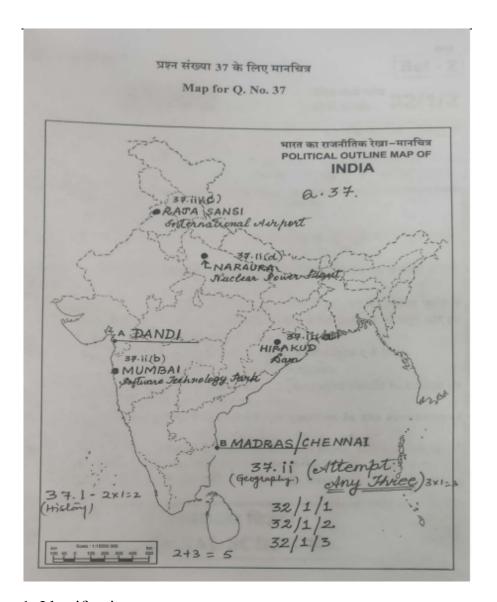
