Correct Answer: (A) D, B, C, A

Solution:

Step 1: Identify the introductory sentence.

Sentence (D) says, "It was his first time performing in front of a crowd."

This sentence introduces the main character and the situation, making it a natural beginning.

Step 2: Describe the setting.

Sentence (B) states, "The stage was brightly lit."

This builds the scene and prepares the reader for the event.

Step 3: Show audience anticipation.

Step 4: Action takes place.

Sentence (A) states, "He took a deep breath and stepped forward."

This shows the main character's response and advances the story.

In arranging sentences, always start with the background or context, then describe the setting, mood or reactions, and finally the action or result.

Solution:

Step 1: Start with the gathering.

Sentence (B) says, "The team gathered in the conference room." This sets the scene and tells us where the action takes place.

Step 2: Introduce the purpose.

Sentence (A) states, "They discussed the agenda for the upcoming meeting." This tells us why they gathered.

Step 3: Describe participation.

Sentence (C) says, "Everyone shared their opinions." This shows active involvement of all members.

Step 4: Conclude with the result.

Sentence (D) states, "Finally, they reached a consensus." This gives a logical conclusion to the meeting.

Summary:

The order $(B) \to (A) \to (C) \to (D)$ describes a clear and chronological flow of events during a meeting.

Quick Tip

For logical sequencing, begin with setting the scene, explain the purpose, describe the process, and finish with the conclusion.

Step 4: Resolution. Sentence (D) states, "We were finally able to get it towed." This completes the sequence with the solution.

Summary: The order $(A) \to (B) \to (C) \to (D)$ provides a clear chronological flow from problem to resolution.

Quick Tip

When arranging sentences about an event, start with the problem, then actions taken, challenges faced, and finally the resolution.

Step 3: Preparation.

Sentence (A) says, "She packed her bags quickly."

She acts quickly to get ready.

Step 4: Final step.

Sentence (C) says, "She set an early alarm before going to bed."

This shows her planning to wake up on time.

Summary:

The order $(B) \to (D) \to (A) \to (C)$ logically presents the timeline: the flight schedule, the motivation not to miss it, hurried packing, and setting the alarm.

When arranging sentences about preparation, begin with the event timeline, then motivation, followed by actions taken, and finally the planning steps.

This shows the response to the bell.

Step 3: Next action.

Sentence (D) states, "Everyone stood in line to buy food."

This shows what the students did after leaving classrooms.

Step 4: Resulting atmosphere.

Sentence (C) says, "The cafeteria was soon filled with noise and chatter."

This describes the final scene.

Summary:

The order $(A) \to (B) \to (D) \to (C)$ logically narrates the sequence from signal to reaction, action, and final setting.

Arrange sentences by first stating the triggering event, then immediate reaction, followed by actions, and conclude with the resulting scenario.

Reading is a common pre-sleep activity.

Step 3: Getting into bed.

Sentence (C) says, "He lay down on the bed."

He prepares to sleep after reading.

Step 4: Turning off the lights.

Sentence (A) says, "He switched off the lights."

Final action before sleeping.

Summary: The sequence $(B) \rightarrow (D) \rightarrow (C) \rightarrow (A)$ describes the logical bedtime routine.

For sequences describing routines, arrange actions in their natural chronological order based on daily habits.

Additionally, many adverbs end with the suffix "-ly," which is the case here.

Quick Tip

Adverbs often end in "-ly" and answer questions like how?, when?, where?, or to what extent? about verbs.

- **8.** Identify the part of speech of the underlined word: The bright light hurt his eyes.
- (A) Noun
- (B) Adjective
- (C) Verb

Correct Answer: (B) Adjective

Solution:

The word "bright" describes the noun "light."

Words that describe or modify nouns are called adjectives.

Since "bright" tells us more about the noun "light" (its quality), it is an adjective.

Quick Tip

Adjectives describe or modify nouns and pronouns by providing qualities, quantities, or states.

Solution:

Therefore, the correct answer is (B) Verb.

Quick Tip

Verbs describe actions, events, or states of being. Look for the word that tells what the subject does.

Solution:

Step 1: Understand the sentence context.

"Since" is used to indicate a specific point in time when the action started (e.g., since 2019, since Monday).

"For" is used to express the length or duration of time (e.g., for two hours, for five years).

Step 3: Apply the correct preposition.

Because the sentence uses a period of time ("five years"), the correct preposition is "for." Correct sentence: "She has been working here **for** five years."

Quick Tip

Use "for" with durations of time, and "since" with starting points in time. Remember:

- For + duration (for three days) - Since + point in time (since Monday)

Solution:

Step 3: Choose the singular verb.

Singular subject requires singular verb "is."

Correct sentence: Neither the students nor the teacher is aware of the change in schedule.

Quick Tip

In sentences with "neither...nor," make the verb agree with the nearer subject.

Solution:

Step 1: Understand the definitions of options.

Step 2: Identify the correct term for a person who writes books.

That person is called an **author**.

Quick Tip

Remember: - Author = writer of books - Editor = reviser - Publisher = distributor -

Narrator = storyteller

Step 2: Identify the correct profession for someone who studies stars and planets.

That person is called an **astronomer**.
